Project Overview

The Flint Hills Regional Council Inc. seeks funding from the U.S. Department of Transportation for funding available through the Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) program for their Supplemental Safety Action Plan for their FHRC Regional SS4A Planning and Demonstration Grant Project which includes the development of a comprehensive Regional Safety Action Plan and the implementation of nine targeted demonstration projects in high-risk locations throughout the region.

This opportunity is a discretionary IIJA program with a local match requirement of 20% of the total project cost. The entity is requesting \$329,340.11 from the Build Kansas Fund, and is providing an in-kind contribution of \$17,333.80. This request has the potential to unlock \$1,386,695.00 in federal funds, for a total project cost of \$1,733,368.91.

The deadline was June 26, 2025, and this Build Kansas Fund application was received on June 26, 2025.

The Flint Hills Regional Council and its member jurisdictions will contribute \$17,333.69 in in-kind services and resources to support the SS4A Action Plan and demonstration project implementation. These contributions reflect a coordinated regional effort to advance transportation safety, engage the public, and pilot context-sensitive interventions. The following entities will provide in-kind support:

- FHRC GIS Analyst will contribute 45 hours of staff time for spatial analysis, including crash data layering, roadway prioritization, and map production.
- FHRC Planning Staff will lead outreach and engagement activities, including community surveys, annotated mapping sessions, and public workshops.
- County Engineers from Riley and Pottawatomie Counties will conduct technical reviews and provide safety recommendations for priority road segments.
- FHRC Planning Manager will coordinate interagency planning efforts, develop narrative content, and synthesize stakeholder and crash data.
- Public Facilities in Riley and Pottawatomie Counties will host seven stakeholder meetings and workshops to gather input and foster collaboration.
- FHRC Member Jurisdictions will supply printing, signage, graphic design, bilingual outreach packets, and digital content for public engagement.
- FHRC Planning and Technical Staff will oversee nine demonstration projects, including vendor coordination, documentation, and evaluation.
- City, County, and Local Jurisdiction Staff will install temporary curb extensions, signage, striping, and other physical elements at nine demonstration sites.
- FHRC will provide an additional \$333.69 in contingency or buffer support to ensure full match compliance and accommodate minor adjustments. This in-kind contribution demonstrates strong regional collaboration, technical capacity, and commitment to advancing transportation safety goals under the SS4A framework.

Describe your efforts Efforts to identify alternative funding sources for this project have been to find other available extensive. However, no American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), local, federal, or non-federal funds are currently available or accessible for this purpose. The participating communities—such as Emmett, St. George, Onaga, Riley, and others—are small, rural municipalities with limited budgets and staffing capacity. These jurisdictions often face significant challenges in meeting local match requirements due to constrained general funds and a lack of discretionary revenues.

> Given these financial limitations, no other sources of match funding can be leveraged at this time. The absence of a match contribution is not due to lack of effort, but rather to the fiscal realities of these rural communities. Without this assistance, these communities will be unable to address critical infrastructure or planning needs that are essential to public health, safety, and long-term viability.

Executive Summary

Build Kansas Fund Match Application for the Flint Hills Regional SS4A Planning and Demonstration Grant

The Flint Hills Regional Council (FHRC), in collaboration with Riley and Pottawatomie Counties and a coalition of small, rural municipalities, is seeking support through the Build Kansas Fund to meet the non-federal match requirement for a regional Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A) Planning and Demonstration Grant. This project represents a critical investment in rural roadway safety across northeastern Kansas, addressing long-standing infrastructure, access, and mobility challenges that jeopardize lives and constrain economic opportunity.

The proposed initiative includes the development of a comprehensive Regional Safety Action Plan and the implementation of nine targeted demonstration projects in high-risk locations throughout the region. Communities included in the initiative are St. George, Onaga, Wheaton, Emmett, Riley, Leonardville, and Randolph—many of which have not previously had the technical resources or capacity to undertake coordinated safety planning or implement Vision Zero-aligned improvements. The regional network includes aging rural highways, key commuter corridors, and unprotected pedestrian areas, many of which serve Fort Riley personnel, schoolchildren, emergency responders, and low-income or aging populations.

Despite relatively low traffic volumes, systemic risk factors have resulted in critical safety concerns that are underrepresented in crash statistics but widely reported by local leaders and community members. Common issues include:

- Unprotected Railroad Crossings: Example—St. George's rail crossing lacks gates or visual warnings, putting students, EMS, and residents at constant risk.
- Lighting Deficiencies: Sidewalks, school zones, and pedestrian paths in Onaga and St. George lack basic illumination.
- School Zone Hazards: Inadequate signage, drop-off controls, and traffic calming at schools in Riley and Onaga.
- Intersection and Corridor Crash Risks: High-speed rural intersections like US-24/US-77 and K-18/Scenic Drive are poorly configured and lack visibility enhancements.
- Lack of ADA Infrastructure: Onaga Community Center lacks accessible pedestrian routes and ramps.

These safety deficiencies are further compounded by the absence of a shared regional planning framework. None of the participating communities have adopted formal Safety Action Plans, and the region lacks consistent GIS-based crash analysis or safety prioritization tools.

To address these issues, the SS4A project will establish a forward-looking Safety Action Plan paired with a series of short-term demonstration pilots designed to test innovative safety strategies tailored for rural contexts. These 60–90 day pilots will generate measurable data,

engage the public, and allow for refinement of cost-effective improvements before full-scale investment.

Demonstration Projects Include:

- Railroad Safety (St. George): Flashing beacons, rumble strips, and advanced signage.
- Solar Lighting (St. George): Enhanced visibility at sidewalk and bus stop locations.
- School Access (Onaga): Delineated walkways, signage, and low-cost traffic calming.
- ADA Accessibility (Onaga Community Center): Modular sidewalks and ramps.
- High-Risk Intersections (US-24/Falcon Rd, US-77): Temporary turning lanes and crosswalk enhancements.
- K-18/Scenic Drive Roundabout: Striping and signage for speed moderation.
- School Traffic Flow (Onaga High School): Temporary road diet, bump-outs, and visual guides.
- Pillsbury Crossing: Speed feedback signs and impaired driving deterrents.
- US-24/US-77 Corridor: Dynamic speed signage and conflict-zone monitoring.

These pilot locations were prioritized through local consultation and regional planning data and align with strategies identified by the Flint Hills Metropolitan Planning Organization. Evaluation metrics will include vehicle speeds, safety incidents, user feedback, and public acceptance—forming a foundation for future capital improvements and long-term Vision Zero policies.

The Build Kansas Fund match is vital to advancing this initiative. Rural communities within the Flint Hills region do not have sufficient local funds or unused federal resources available to meet the SS4A match requirement. Without state support, the opportunity to create a region-wide safety framework and reduce risk for thousands of Kansans will be lost.

By investing in this planning and demonstration grant match, the Build Kansas Fund will directly support the creation of safer, more resilient communities, expand access for vulnerable users, and foster regional collaboration on a scale not previously possible.
